Established in 2011, the Chile California Council (CCC) is a bi-national nonprofit organization that promotes mutually beneficial relationships and knowledge sharing between Chile and California in both the private and public sectors.

OUR HISTORY



1963
Inception of the Chile California Program. In the early 1960's, Chile and California signed an agreement as part of John F. Kennedy's Alliance for Progress Program.



2008
Launch of the Chile California Plan. This plan was created as a result of the MoU between Chile's President Michelle Bachelet and California's then Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger.



2013
Chile and California renew an Agreement for Collaboration. Lt. Governor Gavin Newsom gives keynote address during CCC Annual Meeting highlighting the importance of technology in governance.



2012
The CCC starts operations by appointing an **Executive Director and forming a Board with 5 committees:** Environment, Innovation, Education, Trade, and Society.



2011
The CCC is incorporated as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization during President Sebastián Piñera's visit to California, bringing together representatives from both public and private sectors.



2014
 The CCC Board of Councilors approves a **strategic plan** for the next 4 years, emphasizing functional areas such as fundraising, communications, and finance.



2015
 President Bachelet and Governor Brown signed a **historic joint declaration on Climate Change.** The **New UC Davis Chile Life Science Innovation Center** is launched.



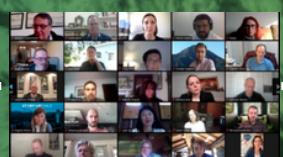
2016
 The CCC facilitates **support and collaboration between CONAF and CALFIRE** on wildfires prevention and control, and **between ONEMI and CAL OES** on disaster management.



2017
 The CCC focuses on three areas: **Natural Resources Management, State and Society, and Technology.** It creates **Chispa-Spark Funding:** a lean platform to fund early-stage projects in Chile and California.



2021
 The CCC focuses on **in-depth structuring and consolidating programs**, in addition to miscellaneous initiatives within its **climate action-driven agenda**, particularly in the clean energy transition and coastal protection.



2020
 Humanity faces a pandemic and the Chile California Council adapts to the **new normal by participating and leading webinars** where relevant issues in today's world are discussed.



2019
 The CCC focuses on **transforming processes to tackle the climate crisis** and participates in the organization of the **COP25**, showcasing California's coastal and Climate Change policies and a Chilean scientific coalition studying climate effects in Chile's coastlines.

LETTER FROM OUR CHAIR



Dear Friends of the Chile California Council,

The year 2023 presented significant challenges for the Council. Its operation was impacted by a lack of staff and funds necessary to support hiring and financing activities. Consequently, the CCC entered a "hibernation" phase for most of 2023. During this period, the Board worked collaboratively with DECYTI personnel at the Chilean Ministry of Foreign Affairs to develop the 2023 agreement. All parties successfully signed the agreement in August 2023, with the Ministry funds being received by mid-November 2023. This enabled the Council to hire a Program Manager and a Marketing & Communications Manager at the end of 2023. Their task was to develop a Strategic Plan and a Marketing and Communications Plan, to bring clarity to our 2024 implementation efforts.

Despite these financial and staffing challenges, the Council continued to deliver value to Chile and California in 2023 through the efforts of its Board of Directors and Councilors, as well as those led by the Chile California Conservation Exchange (CCCx).

In February and March 2023, I was able to forge connections between the Municipality of Viña del Mar and Councilor Helen López from the California Office of Emergency Services (CalOES). Helen and I shared valuable Californian insights and best practices to assist Viña del Mar to more effectively mitigate, manage, and recover from forest fires and other natural disasters.

Together with Councilors Juan Pablo Carvallo and Ignacio Fernández, the CCC played a pivotal role in facilitating a successful visit to California in August 2023 by the Minister of Energy, Diego Pardow and his delegation. Leveraging our expertise and networks within California's energy sectors, we organized productive meetings addressing key issues requested by the Chileans, thereby laying the groundwork for continued future collaboration.

Another major effort of the Council was our continued support of the CCCx and our shared commitment to fostering exchanges and conferences between both regions by engaging key stakeholders from academia, NGOs, government, and Congress. Discussions have centered around topics such as Real Conservation Rights, Environmental Philanthropy, and Park and Coastal Zone Conservation. Throughout the year, the CCCx facilitated exchanges through trips of Californians to Chile and Chileans to California.

Looking forward, we're excited to announce the CCC's full reactivation after the 2023 slowdown. Your dedication and involvement are crucial as we identify focus areas, emerging sectors, and collaboration opportunities for impactful initiatives. Committed to driving innovation and collaboration between Chile and California, we eagerly anticipate making 2024 a transformative year, embracing tomorrow's challenges with optimism and determination.

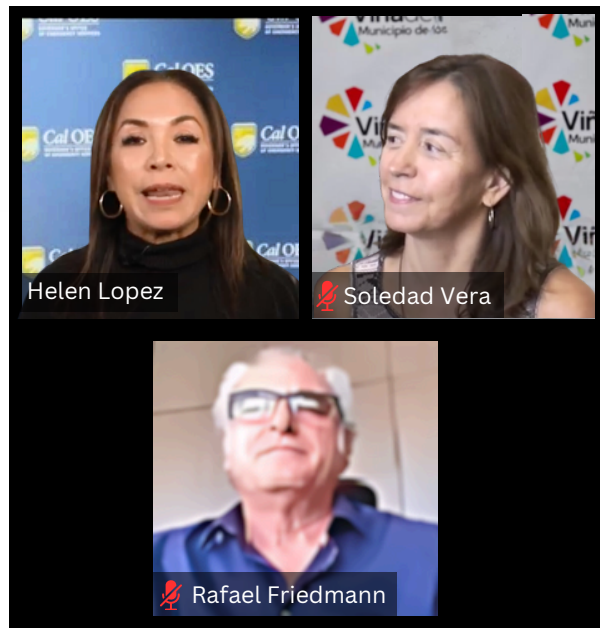
VIÑA DEL MAR AND CAL OES MEETINGS ON WILDFIRES PREVENTION, MANAGEMENT, AND RECOVERY

In February and March of 2023, our Chair of the Board, Rafael Friedmann, connected the Municipality of Viña del Mar with CCC Councilor Helen López, who works at the California Office of Emergency Services (CalOES) as Assistant Director for International and Tribal Affairs.

Following the fire that in early 2023 destroyed around 500 residential and commercial structures in the area, virtual meetings were held between the Municipality of Viña del Mar, the CCC, and CalOES where Helen Lopez shared best practices used in California for the prevention, management, and subsequent recovery of disasters like urban wildfires. Additionally, CalOES provided the Municipality of Viña del Mar with three documents: a Disaster Preparedness Guide and two Disaster Preparedness Cards.

Furthermore, Rafael Friedmann shared links from PG&E (California Gas and Electricity Company), where he previously worked. Rafael described how PG&E coordinates with various government agencies to reduce the risk of wildfires, manage them more effectively, and help with the recovery by communities affected by them.

This activity reflects the CCC's continuous support for the exchange of experiences and best practices to reduce disaster risk, effectively manage responses to them, and accelerate society's recovery post-disaster, which has been done before in activities such as providing support with on-site visits by Chileans and Californians from CalFire, CONAF, ONEMI, CalOES, and PG&E.



SUPPORT WITH THE CHILEAN MINISTER OF ENERGY DIEGO PARDOW'S VISIT TO CALIFORNIA



In April 2023, the Ministry of Energy unveiled the "Initial Agenda for a Second Phase of Energy Transition" aimed at accelerating the decarbonization of the electricity sector in Chile. Minister Diego Pardow emphasized the crucial role of the electricity sector in achieving climate and environmental goals, with a target of 100% clean energy by 2050. Additionally, since 2022, the Ministry has been part of the Net Zero World Initiative, focusing on energy decarbonization.

In August 2023, the Ministry organized a visit for Minister Pardow to California to learn from the region's experiences in transitioning to carbon neutrality. The CCC played a pivotal role in coordinating and executing this visit, with Counselors Juan Pablo Carvallo and Ignacio Fernández, along with the Chair of the Board, Rafael Friedmann, supporting the Ministry and the Chilean Embassy in the United States. This visit facilitated knowledge transfer on technological, regulatory, financial, and human capital aspects related to advanced energy transition technologies, programs, and policies between Chile and California.

During the visit, Minister Pardow and his delegation held meetings with key entities in California, including the California Energy Commission, the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, and the WATT Coalition. The CCC's involvement ensured effective communication between Chile and California, fostering collaboration towards mutual goals of energy transition and climate action.

Overall, the CCC's support for Minister Pardow's visit to California exemplifies its commitment to fostering connections between Chile and California and supporting initiatives that contribute to fulfilling Chile's commitments to Climate Change.

CCC PARTICIPATION IN THE 2023 APEC MEETING WITH PRESIDENT GABRIEL BORIC AND THE CHILEAN COMMUNITY



During the APEC 2023 summit in October, Chilean President Gabriel Boric had two activities in the city of San Francisco. Upon arrival, he met with a group of Chileans living in the state of California, with whom he had a conversation at the Marriott Hotel in San Francisco. Among those attending the meeting was the president of the Chile-California Council in California, Rafael Friedmann, along with CCC Counselors Evan Epstein, Eduardo Bendek, Isabel Valdés, Agustín Huneus, Ignacio Fernández, Tomás McKay, and Álvaro Silberstein.

The head of state highlighted the vital Chile-California relationship in commercial terms and the importance of promoting the culture and society of both countries.

Regarding Climate Change, the Chile-California Council recognizes the urgency of addressing environmental concerns. These include greenhouse gas emissions, air quality, and carbon footprint, all of which have negative impacts on ecosystems and human health. For that reason, the CCC is deeply committed to spearheading future initiatives related to renewable energy, Climate Change mitigation, and environmental conservation efforts aimed at achieving zero emissions while collaboratively working to promote a more sustainable and healthier environment for current and future generations.

HIGHLIGHTS

CHILE CALIFORNIA CONSERVATION EXCHANGE (CCCX)

Inspired by the geographic and ecological similarities of Chile and California, the Chile California Conservation Exchange (CCCx) connects people in Chile and California who are working to protect the natural environment by making introductions, organizing meetings and conferences, and facilitating travel and collaboration.

In close collaboration with the Chile California Council, we host Chilean scientific delegations visiting California and organize exchange visits to Chile–Intercambios ambientales.

THE CLIMATE CRISIS: TREE RING RESEARCH

JANUARY 2023, CHILE

The purpose of the trip was to exchange knowledge with Chilean dendrochronologists and other environmental scientists about how the changing climate is manifest in hydroclimates, forest ecosystems, and tree rings –particularly in the understudied Mediterranean climate zone– and to lay the groundwork for future collaborations.

Professor Stine and his graduate student, Triana Anderson, spent time in Valparaíso, Papudo (for field work), Santiago, Valdivia, Concepción, and Parque Nacional Conguillio. Triana Anderson has been awarded a Fulbright fellowship to return to Chile in 2024 to work with the researchers she met through the exchange.



BIRD CONSERVATION AND MONITORING

MARCH 2023, CHILE

The purpose of this exchange was to share state-of-the-art knowledge with respect to bird conservation and monitoring, banding, and citizen science and to establish an ongoing collaborative relationship between The Institute of Bird Populations (IBP) and La Red de Observadores de Aves y Vida Silvestre de Chile (ROC). Steven Albert and the IBP have particular expertise in the types of monitoring that strive to understand the causes of long-term bird population changes.

ROC is working on a nationwide bird conservation strategy for Chile and has recently completed two foundational documents: Estrategia Nacional de Conservación de Aves (ENCA) 2021-2030 and Plan General de Monitoreo de Aves de Chile. While in Chile, Steven held meetings, presented at workshops with staff from the Ministry of the Environment, CONAF, other NGO's and faculty at the P. Universidad Católica de Chile. ROC and IBP solidified plans for their ongoing collaboration.

HIGHLIGHTS

PROTECTION OF FREE-FLOWING RIVERS

MARCH 2023, CHILE

The Pew Charitable Trust Chilean Patagonia Program brought together community-based NGOs and others for a series of events in Patagonia focusing on the protection of rivers. These were followed by a seminar on water policy at the Congress in Santiago. The CCCx enabled Denielle Perry, who is, among other roles, the Director of the Free-Flowing Rivers Lab at Northern Arizona University, and Felicia Marcus, former Chair of the California Water Resources Control Board, to participate in both the Patagonia and Santiago events. Denielle presented an overview of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act and explained how the policy could be used as a framework for creating a river conservation system in Chile.

In Santiago, Felicia and Denielle participated on a panel with two senators, the Vice Minister of the Environment, the head of the Chilean water department, and Patricio Vallespin, Governor of the Los Lagos Region. The panel was facilitated by Francisco Solis, Director of the Pew Chilean Patagonia Program. In both Futaleufu and Santiago, Felicia Marcus discussed water policy in California, including a variety of flow protection tools, including the public trust. The group discussed the need for Chile to meet the 30 x 30 agenda by initiating river protection strategies. Governor Vallespin requested that the Ministry of the Environment begin to craft river conservation policies to protect four rivers in Chile: Futaleufu, Palena, Yelcho, and Puelo. Senator Ricardo Lagos Weber invited Dr. Perry to return to Chile to help with the crafting of a new river conservation policy and system design.



HIGHLIGHTS

WATER AND DESALINIZATION

MARCH 2023, CHILE

Seminars in Santiago and Valparaiso were organized to follow up on the publication of *Desalinización: Oportunidades y Desafíos Para Abordar la Inseguridad Hídrica en Chile* (Desalination: Opportunities and Challenges to Address Water Insecurity in Chile), a report by the Scientific Committee on Climate Change at the Ministry of Science, Technology, Knowledge and Innovation.

The CCCx enabled Claire Waggoner from the California State Water Resources Control Board to participate in the seminars and share California's experience with developing and implementing desalination regulations. She addressed the importance of using an integrated water resource management approach to increase water resiliency, outlined California's desalination regulations, and explained where desalination fits in California's water supply portfolio.



FOG

MARCH 2023, BERKELEY, CA

The CCCx hosted a roundtable workshop at UC Berkeley, which was the last step in a California study tour by a group of experts on fog and the environment from the Atacama Desert Center of P. Universidad Católica de Chile. The team is building a network of fog collectors along the extensive Chilean coast that is complemented by satellite imagery and other analytic methods. They were visiting California to share their experience and to learn about new fog sites, data management, and technologies and to gain a better understanding of the behavior of California fog and coastal ecosystems. Among other benefits, fog sustains California's redwoods and is harvested for water in dry climates. While in Northern California, the Chilean delegation visited Berkeley, Sacramento, the Bodega Marine Lab, and Pepperwood Preserve.

The University of California Natural Reserve System has a cooperative agreement with P. Universidad Católica that we expect to build upon for future exchanges.

MARINE SCIENCE: KELP CONSERVATION

MAY 2023, CHILE

Kelp forests play a critical role in sustaining fish populations and kelp is harvested for a variety of uses. Chile exports about 67,000 tons of kelp annually.

Oceana Chile organized a meeting at the Chilean National Fisheries Service and a workshop at the Chilean National Congress to highlight the ecological and economic importance of kelp and the need for science-based policies to maintain viable kelp populations.

The CCCx made it possible for Dan Reed and Jan Friewald to attend these events. Dan discussed the status of the kelp industry in California, the reasons for dramatic declines in the kelp forests, the effects of Climate Change, the extent of restoration attempts, and the roles of the California Coastal Act and the Marine Life Protection Act in protecting the kelp forests from overfishing and coastal development. Jan Friewald described how the Reef Check Foundation trains local scuba divers to be citizen scientists with the skills to conduct scientific surveys and monitor the kelp forests along the coast of California.
